Claudio Amendola (Rome, 1963) made his acting debut at the age of 19 in the television drama Storia d'amore e d'amicizia by Franco Rossi. In 1983 he made his debut on the big screen with Lontano da dove by Stefania Casini and Francesca Marciano. After starring in comedies he began playing more dramatic roles such as those in Soldati - 365 all'alba (1987) and Mery per sempre [Mary Forever] (1988) by Marco Risi, Ultrà e La scorta (1993) by Ricky Tognazzi, Poliziotti [Policemen] (1994) by Giulio Base and Who Killed Pasolini? (1995) by Marco Tullio Giordana. In 1993 his performance as Mauro in *Un'altra vita* by Carlo Mazzacurati won him a David di Donatello award. His performance the following year in Patrice Chéreau's La Reine Margot earned him international recognition. Since then he has worked on dramatic films such as La mia generazione (1996) by Wilma Labate and Testimone a rischio [An Eyewitness Account] (1997) by Pasquale Pozzessere - for both films Amendola was nominated for a David di Donatello for best actor - Le mani forti (1997) by Franco Bernini, and II partigiano Johnny [Johnny the Partisan] (2000) by Guido Chiesa. Since 2006, he spent many seasons playing the popular lead role in the hit television series I Cesaroni. The success of the show has not prevented him from continuing with film work both as an actor in Suburra by Stefano Sollima, in the role of "Samurai" (2015), and as a director, with his debut film La mossa del pinguino.
