Christian Duguay (Outremont, Montreal, 1957) graduated from the Concordia University Film School and started out as a Steadicam operator and cinematographer. After directing for television, he made his first feature-length film in 1991, Scanners II: The New Order, the sequel to Scanners. The following year he made Live Wire. His sci-fi film Screamers, loosely based on a story by Philip K. Dick, "Second Variety", premiered at the Toronto Film Festival in 1995. He directed the film The Assignment in 1997, and two years later his TV miniseries Joan of Arc racked up twelve nominations for the Emmy Awards and four for the Golden Globes. His subsequent forays into television, Hitler: The Rise of Evil in 2003 and Coco Chanel in 2008, were also hits. Duguay made his next feature film, Jappeloup, in 2013. Before adapting the memoir Un sac de billes for the big screen, he directed the sequel to Belle & Sebastian, called Belle & Sebastian: The adventure continues.
