Jesper Stein (1965) lives in the Nørrebro guarter of Copenhagen. After getting a journalism degree in 1996, he became a reporter for one of Denmark's leading dailies, the Jyllands-Posten, distinguishing himself both for his in-depth reporting on court cases and as a war correspondent. In 2005 he started covering culture and writing book reviews, becoming a member of the Danish Crime Academy the following year. In 2008 he contributed to the writing of *Man jager et bæst og fanger et menneske*, the autobiography of Bent Isager-Nielsen, former task force head. He made his novel-writing debut in 2012 with Unrest, considered one of Denmark's best first novels in the genre; it won the Danish Crime Academy Award. From that time on, Stein turned out a book a year for the next three years, including his second novel Bye Bye Blackbird and a story published in an anthology entitled Over grænsen. In 2016 his novel Aisha won the Danish booksellers' Golden Laurels Award. The previous year he had received the Dan Turèll Medal for his series of crime novels featuring Axel Steen, a police inspector with a double life: when at work with his colleagues at the Homicide Division, he's a hard-boiled cop, but at home he's fragile and a chronic worrier. He takes care of his daughter by day and by night turns to hashish to medicate his long-standing insomnia that constantly reminds him of his fear of death. Thirty-seven-years old, divorced, Steen lives in Nørrebro, Copenhagen's hip multicultural guarter, peopled by artists, addicts and prostitutes. Actually, Alex Steen has more than a few things in common with his creator, starting with his address. Jesper Stein's novels have been sold in numerous countries, along with their film rights.
